#### Our Lady of Sorrows -A Reflection on the Sufferings of Mary

THE FEAST OF OUR LADY OF SORROWS falls on 15th September (Saturday) and commemorates the seven great sorrows which Mary lived in relation to Her Son, as they are recorded in the Gospels or through Tradition. This feast day was born of the Servite Order, and in the seventeenth and eighteenth century it spread throughout the Catholic Church.

I would like to share an excerpt from "Our Lady of Sorrows" by Fr. Paul Haffner (Inside the Vatican, Sep. 2004):

"This feast is dedicated to the spiritual martyrdom of Mary, Mother of God, and her compassion with the sufferings of her Divine Son, Jesus. In her sufferings as co-redeemer, she reminds us of the tremendous evil of sin and shows us the way of true repentance.

May the numerous tears of the Mother of God be conducive to our salvation: with which tears Thou, O God, art able to wash away the sins of the whole world."

Prior to the Second Vatican Council, there were two Feasts devoted to the sorrows of Mary. The first Feast was instituted in Cologne in 1413 as an expiration for the sins of the iconoclast Hussites. The second is attributed to the Servite order whose principal devotion are the Seven Sorrows. It was instituted in 1668, though the devotion had been in existence since 1239 - five years after the founding of the order.

Our Lady of Sorrows feast day calls to mind these seven sorrows and we ought to reflect on them. They are:

- The Prophecy of Simon (Luke 2:25-35)
- The Flight into Egypt (Matthew 2:13-15)
- Loss of the Child Jesus for three days (Luke 2:41-50)
- Mary Meets Jesus on his way to Calvary (Luke 23:27-31, John: 19:17)
- Crucifixion and Death of Jesus (John 19:25-30)
- The Body of Jesus being taken from the Cross (Psalm 130; Luke 23:50-54; John 19:31-37)
- The Burial of Jesus (Isaiah 53:8; Luke 23:50-56; John 19:38-42; Mark 15:40-47)

On this feast day I urge you to do something special, something out of your way, to honour and reflect on Our Lady of Sorrows.

Holy Mary, Mother of God, pray for us sinners now and at the hour of our death. Amen.

#### Pope Francis: A Man of His Word

Monsignor Dario Viganò, the head of the Pontifical Council for Social Communications, invited filmmaker Wim Wenders to make a film on Pope Francis. Wenders was raised a Catholic in postwar Dusseldorf. After many years away from Catholicism, Wenders became a churchgoer again, this time as a Protestant; the work of the Catholic Richard Rohr, a Franciscan spiritual writer based in New Mexico, has had a powerful effect on him. Wenders was given uncommon access to Pope Francis, and to the Vatican's footage of Francis's pontificate. Wenders was assured substantial independence, with the Vatican exercising no formal approval over the final cut or over his approach in general.

The film title, "Pope Francis: A Man of His Word," suggests the nature of the work. In his five years as Pope, Jorge Bergoglio has made certain ideas the basis for his work. The best known is mercy. In a September, 2013, interview with Jesuit priest Fr Antonio Spadaro, Pope Francis said, the Church should be like "a field hospital after battle," a place to care for others without making distinctions based on faith or lack of faith. "It is useless to ask a seriously injured person if he has high cholesterol, or about the level of his blood sugars. You have to heal his wounds. Then we can talk about everything else." At the same moment, he set out another crucial idea. The Church, he said, "needs to warm the hearts of the faithful . . . it needs nearness, proximity." The Church, especially the clergy, should be among the people—most importantly the poor—seeing their lives and challenges near at hand. Friends and family should be in proximity to each other, through time spent together: meals, conversations, affection, tenderness. All this is framed by the conviction that the central Christian mystery—God becoming man, the father sending his son—is about the divine effort to draw nearer to humanity, and vice versa.

Fr Anthony Egan SJ concludes his examination of the first five years of Pope Francis' pontificate by saying, "One disturbing feature of the first five years of Francis' pontificate is Catholic attitudes towards him. While among non-Catholics, non-Christians and even non-believers, Francis is generally liked, even loved, Catholics are divided about him. Most lay Catholics like him as a person. But opinions divide as one moves to both left and right of the majority in the centre. Fr Egan goes further to say, Catholics leaning towards varying degrees of conservatism, would be more hostile to Francis because they claim he's undermined doctrinal truth and perhaps the 'dignity' of the office. They object to his 'tampering' with Church laws on divorce and remarriage, feel he's introduced moral relativism into the Church by his apparent emphasis on conscience and mercy over law. His criticism of clericalism (clericalism - a policy of maintaining or increasing the power of a religious hierarchy) has, they say, also attacked the integrity and dignity of the priesthood. Some go to the extreme edge to label Francis' social action and teaching as 'communist' or at very least proof that liberation theology has overthrown Catholic orthodoxy. Moving to clergy and bishops we see a similar split in attitudes to Francis. Once again, from reading and conversations, I sense that there is both a theological and generational split. At the risk of oversimplifying, I think that clergy who either remember Vatican II with affection, or who have done extensive studies particularly in church history, are unworried by Francis. Those formed in a more conservative theological environment, who remember the turbulent post-Vatican II period with unease, or who enthusiastically embraced John Paul II's pontificate, tend to be hostile. Another factor is one's theology of priesthood. Those who see priesthood as ministry with God's people - preaching, teaching, ministering the sacraments, together with some degree of social engagement - are I suspect sympathetic to Francis. Those who see priesthood as primarily being 'a breed apart', 'chosen' find him terrifying. When Francis lambasted priests for clericalism early in his pontificate – perhaps quite harshly, perhaps over-stressing the worst excesses of clericalism, though by no means inaccurately - it put them into a panic, confirming for some that he was 'undermining' the Church they 'knew' to be true.

Whatever their extent, the fact that a significant number of clergy and bishops are to varying degrees uneasy with or opposed to Francis is a problem. While balanced, reasoned, respectful and sincere dialogue is something Francis clearly accepts. Outrightly aggressive opposition, passive obstruction or a decision to sit out the pontificate is unhelpful. *A lot of the material used in this article is borrowed from what Fr Anthony Egan SJ has written, as also Fr Antonio Spadaro SJ.* Gerard Lobo
